Shining the light against Domestic & Sexual Violence

From the Director's Desk:

I should be starting this newsletter off with a "Happy Spring" or "Welcome to Spring" salutation, but instead the newsletter, like many other parts of our lives, is starting with an acknowledgement that this spring is not like any other most of us have seen. It started in February with mentions of a "virus in China", continued in early March with numbers rising in the United States and by mid-March we were talking about social distancing, teleworking, unthinkable loss of human life and a troubled economy. Weeks later, we are still in that same mind-set and still unsure of what the future holds.

While we grieve the loss of eating at our favorite restaurant and cancelled vacations from the relative safety of our homes, I want to take a minute to consider the privilege it is to be safe in our homes. For our survivors, the home is not safe. For families in homes impacted by domestic violence, quarantine or stay at home orders, are scary and dangerous. During a four day period in early April ESCADV had three families come into shelter because home wasn't a safe place during a stay at home order or anytime. We expect that our hotline calls and shelter intakes will remain high during this COVID-19 event.

If I know one thing about the Eastern Shore of Virginia, it is that our community will take care of each other anytime, but especially during a crisis. Due to sheltering families separately during this time for healthy and safety, our shelter costs are significantly higher, food and cleaning supplies

costs are up and these supplies can be difficult to obtain. During the past few weeks and continuing throughout this COVID-19 event, ESCADV will be sharing our current "wish list" on a weekly basis. It may be food, cleaning supplies, diapers, or masks. Financial contributions will assist with these costs as well as the additional costs of hotel rooms to keep sheltered survivors safe from the spread of

COVID-19. Together, we will help each family seeking services begin their path to a safer life.

The support we have already seen is amazing, but as you know, our needs will

be continuing. Now more than ever, your support is needed to allow us to continue to meet the needs of survivors. Thank you for your past support, thank you in advance for your support to come. It takes a community to create a better, safer place. ESCADV could not do this without you. Thank you for helping us help others.




