

At ESCADV, the goal is to help clients find success. Recognizing that success will look different for every client, below are highlights of some of those success stories.

- A Hispanic woman was able to return to her previous home state and regain custody of her children, finding safe living accommodations for herself and her children.
- Kids who were acting out in • school were able to be a part of developing a plan to improve their behaviors. With this support, they were able to succeed in being promoted to the next grade level.
- A woman with medical issues was able • to apply for medical coverage and get treatment for her medical concerns.

The Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence (ESCADV) is registered with The AmazonSmile Foundation as one of their charities. This foundation is affiliated with Amazon, the online company where you can buy just about

What products are eligible for charitable donations? Tens of millions of products on AmazonSmile are eligible for donations. You will see eligible products marked "Eligible for AmazonSmile donation" on their product detail pages.

Can you use your existing Amazon.com account on AmazonSmile? Yes, you use the same account on Amazon.com and AmazonSmile. Your shopping cart, Wish List, wedding or baby registry, etc. and other account settings are also the same.
